Positive Adoption Language

We often find that language dictates meaning in ways that we are unaware. There are subtleties of meaning, of values and of attitudes that come across in the words we choose to use, or not use. This is especially true with adoption language. Notice the different connotations the words below denote.

NEGATIVE/INCORRECT MESSAGE POSITIVE ADOPTION MESSAGE

She gave her baby up. She was unable to parent. She didn't want her baby. She made an adoption plan.

She put her baby out for adoption.

He is illegitimate. His parents were unmarried.

She is the child's 'real' parent. She is the child's birth parent.

They are not her 'real' parents. They are her adoptive parents.

Which ones are their real kids? The oldest children were born. Which are their own children? into the family or why do you ask?

Was it a foreign adoption? Was theirs an international adoption?

He's a handicapped or troubled child. He is a child from a hard place or a child who experience

trauma.
